



80% of health outcome drivers are <u>not</u> health care access and quality







What are Social Determinants of Health?

Social Determinants of Health (SDOH) are conditions in the places where people live, learn, work, and play that affect a wide range of health and quality-of life-risks and outcomes. SDOH can be more impactful on patients' health than the clinical care that they receive.





What are Health Disparities?

Health disparities are preventable differences in the burden of disease, rates of injury, exposure to violence or one's ability to live a healthy life. All groups of people experience disease. However, not all groups contract, experience and recover from diseases at the same rates.

Income & Health

Adults experiencing poverty are **5 times as likely** as their more affluent peers to report **poor levels of health.**

Lower-income Americans have **higher rates of chronic conditions,** including heart disease, diabetes and stroke.

Maternal & Infant Mortality

Black and Indigenous women have **maternal mortality death rates 2 to 4 times higher** than their white counterparts.

Rates of infant death are twice as high for non-Hispanic Black and Pacific Islander babies than white and Asian babies

Illustrative examples of health disparities

Cancer

Black women are disproportionately more likely to die from breast cancer than women of other ethnicities.

Black men are disproportionately more likely to die from colorectal cancer than men of other ethnicities.



Identification

Centered on identifying areas of opportunity to address health disparities, DEI Councils will select Clinical Areas of Focus to target in their Health Equity Plans during this phase.


Solutions

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Empathy in Action: The Ripple Effect of SDOH Screenings on Patient Care

-Came back to Seneca for breastfeeding assistance and postpartum care.



Not sure where to start...

Just start somewhere: listen to what they tell you and learn what their needs are.



When I contacted her to give her information on our patient portal, I helped her set up her portal but quickly realized there was a language barrier.

I noticed that she appeared to be Spanish speaking even though our system says her preferred language is English.

I decided to email her and ask a few questions. I told her that the hospital was looking for ideas to make the hospital more "userfriendly" for our Spanish-speaking population and asked her if she would be interested in helping us.



Collaboration

"It's an excellent idea, yes, I am willing to collaborate and answer any questions you may have. The truth is, it is necessary because there are many people in need. I have received a lot of help from the hospital. I am very grateful to my doctors, and I am very grateful for the help they have given me and even more so in these difficult economic times because I have not been able to work. I am working independently, and the salaries are very low. Communication is very important, especially, because most of us do not speak English and we only speak Spanish or understand very little of the language."

- She pointed out that our website did not convert to Spanish, so she had a hard time understanding the website.
- She said there were errors with the bill pay that she was coming across.
- We found out that our patient portal was not fully built in Spanish.
- She said there were assistance programs that she could not tell if she qualified for because they were not in Spanish.



We can and MUST do better

We worked to fulfill her immediate needs. I asked her if I could provide her with more assistance which she was very grateful for.

Google Translate has been very helpful for communicating via email.

I immediately started working on ways to improve her situation as well as making improvements for our Spanish-speaking population.

- Provided her with a list of basic SDOH resources.
- Consulted our Community Health Worker.
- **/ Logged a service request with our EMR to complete the patient portal.**
- Discussed ideas with our PFAC.
- Discussed at our Quality meeting as well as with our Board.
- Continuing to educate and look for opportunities to improve and continue to communicate with Luisa.

I later found out that one of our registration clerks had also built a rapport with our Spanish speaking population by using Google translate as well.

In appointments, we have an I-pad for translation services. We are also using this service for scheduling appointments and can add the translators to the phone.



Thankful and Grateful

• All the resources that I provided to Luisa, she then shared with other Spanish-speaking people in our area. This will continue to build trust and rapport.

- Our CHW hopes to be able to provide more resources to the Hispanic and Latino population and hopes this has opened a door.
- The more we worked together, the more she shared her story. She was very grateful and thankful for the efforts we are making and thanked me for caring about the struggles that they face.
- In Venezuela, Luisa was teaching university-level classes on research methodology. In Seneca, Luisa's making artwork with resin and has recently obtained a license to become a nail technician and provide manicures.

• I am grateful for her willingness to share and have the upmost respect for her and all she has gone through. It has been an eye-opening experience.
